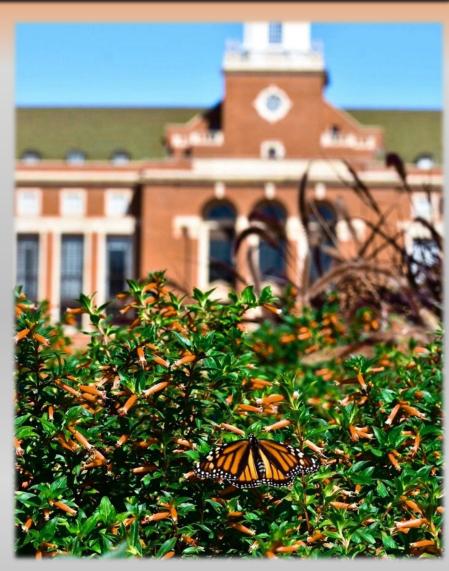

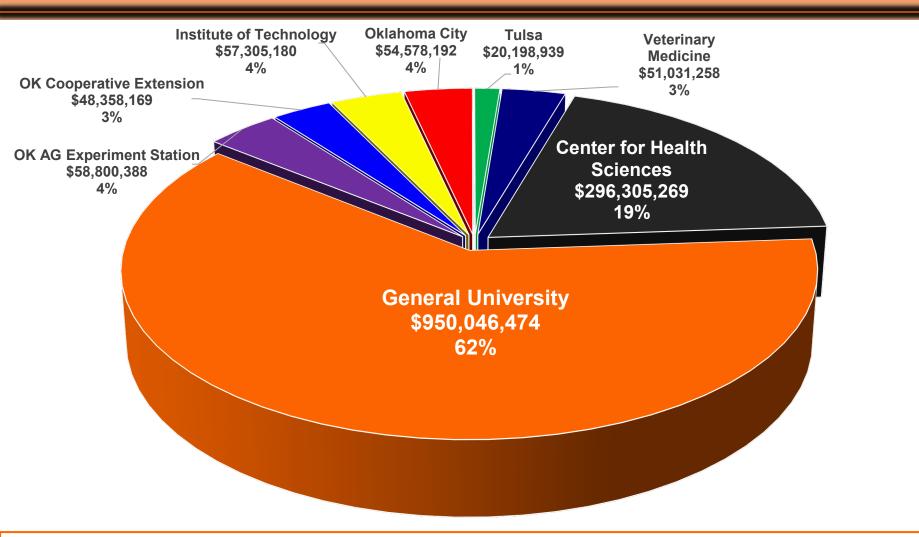

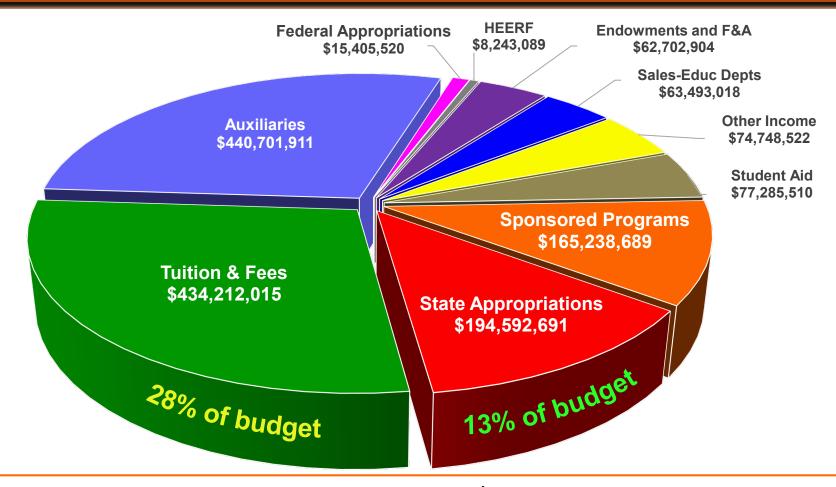


All Revenue – By Agency



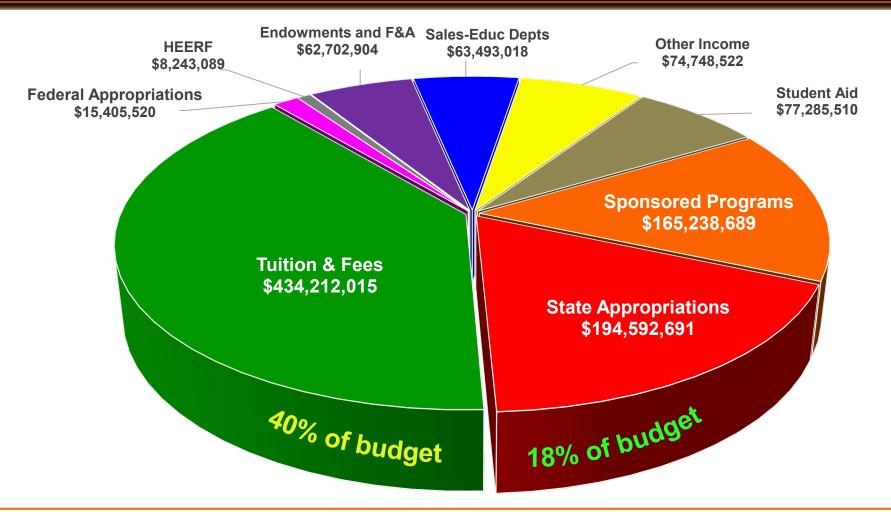
FY 2023 Total Revenue = \$1.5 Billion

Sources Of Revenue – All Agencies



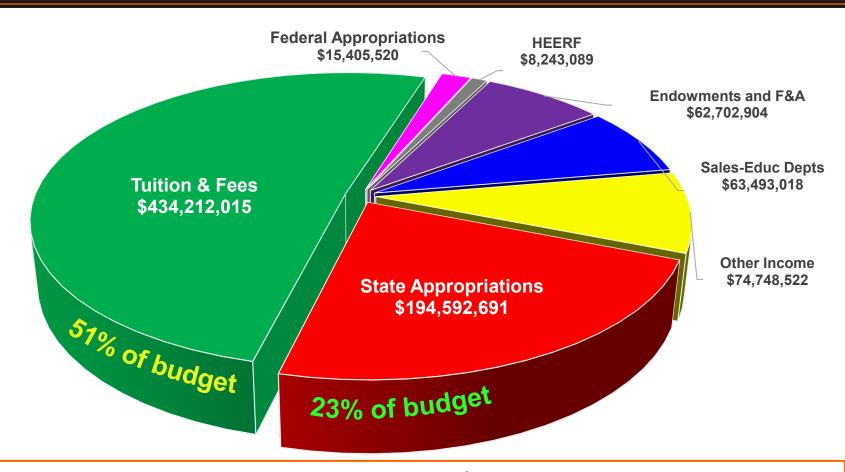
FY 2023 Total Revenue = \$1.5 Billion Estimated System Enrollment = 32,706

FY 2023 <u>**E&G**</u> Revenue = \$853 Million

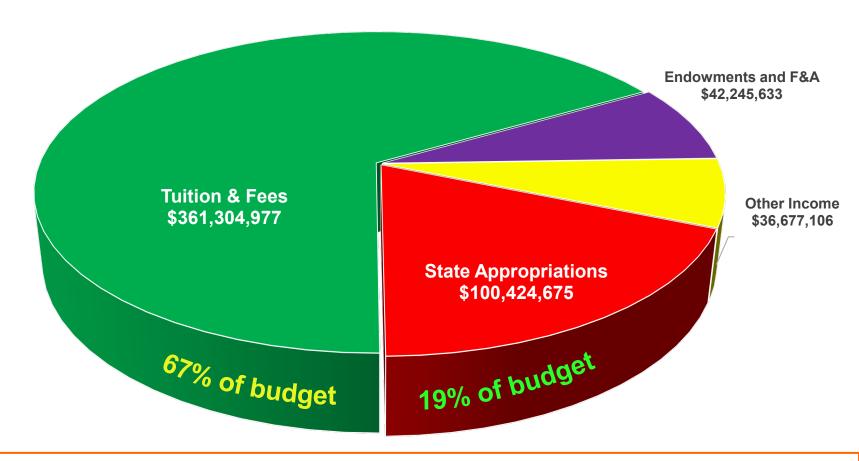

Sources Of <u>Educational & General</u> (E&G) Revenue – General University Only



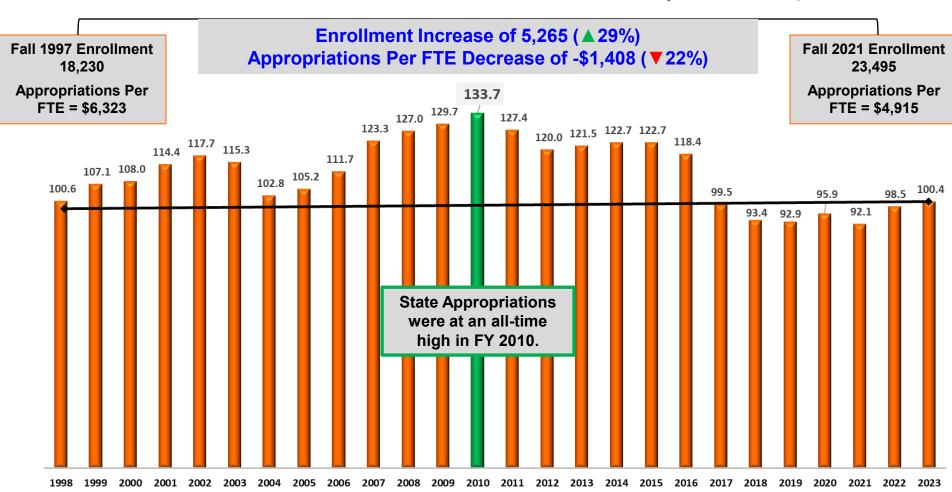
FY 2023 General University <u>E&G</u> Revenue = \$541 Million

Decrease in state appropriations to GU since FY 2010

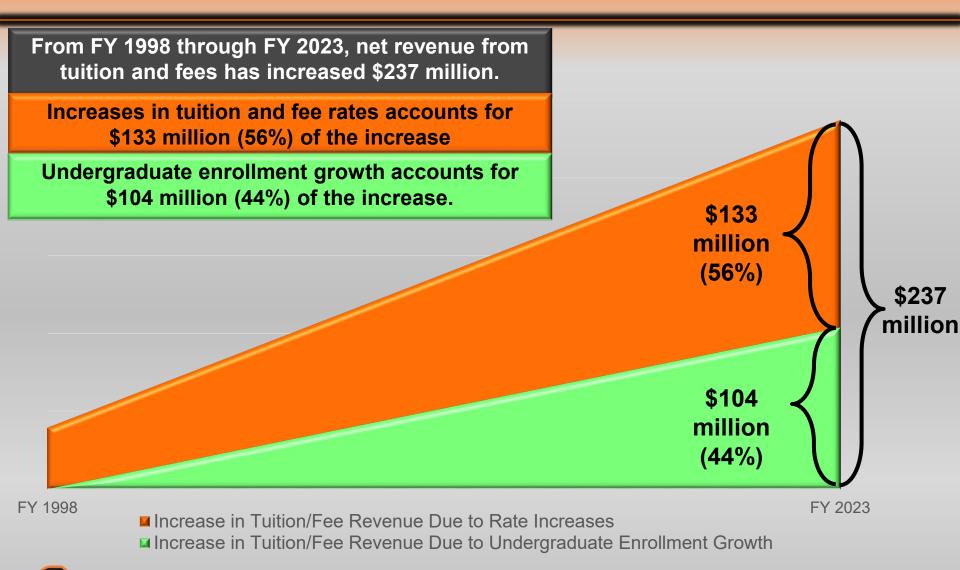

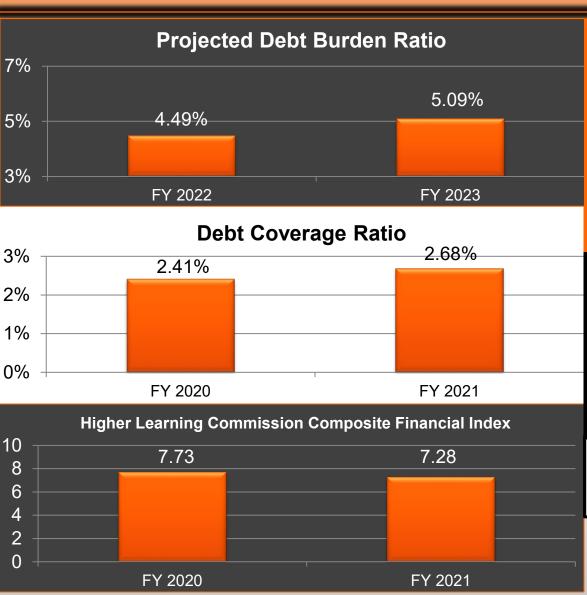


Enrollment Growth And Rate Increases Account For Increased Tuition/Fee Revenue

Current OSU Debt \$857 Million

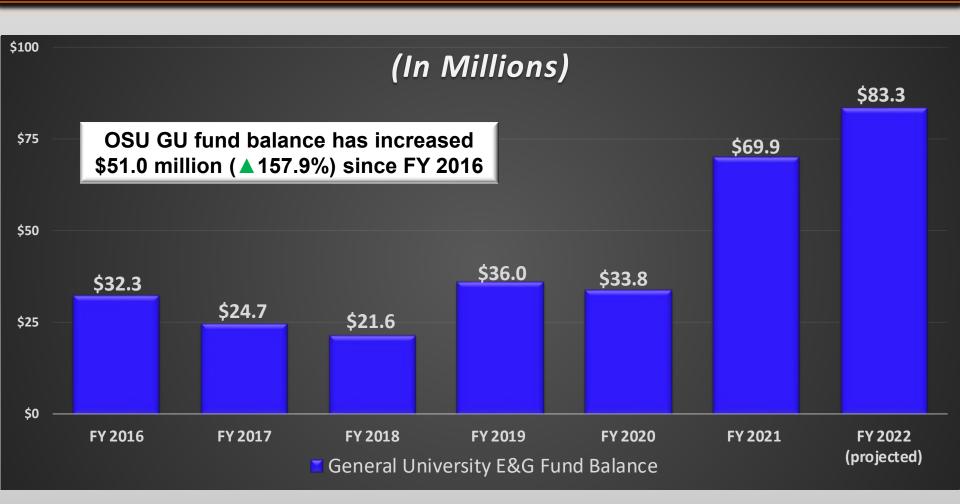


Additional Information On Debt

- Over the past five years, OSU has refinanced almost 65% of total debt for savings. Accordingly, debt refinancing going forward will be limited but still targeted for additional potential savings.
- Ten years ago, OSU was paying approximately 5.0% for 30-year tax-exempt debt. Currently, we are paying approximately 3.7%.
- Borrowing for FY 2023 is expected to include the New Frontiers building, Central Market Place and Boone Pickens Stadium renovations.

❖ In FY 2023, earnings utilized within the budget will increase by \$7.2 million (▲24%).

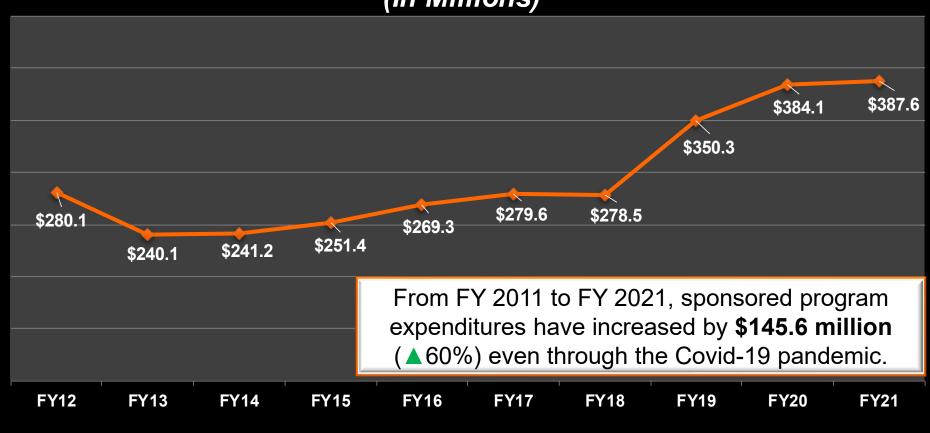


Endowment earnings incorporated into the institutional budget helps OSU minimize increases in student costs. For example, endowment earnings of \$30.1 million for General University is equivalent to a 14.9% increase in tuition and fee rates.

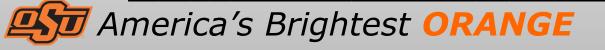

- Facilities management expenses (additional utility charges for running HVAC systems longer, classroom space rentals)
- * Expenses related to providing additional sick leave for COVID
- * Write off of student receivables that had enrollment holds
- * AV & Network Equipment for classrooms
- * Renting hotel space for COVID quarantines
- * Additional expenses for COVID vaccines/testing
- * F&A on expenses listed above



OSU Strategy

- Since fall 2021, a structured, system-wide process for creating a strategy for OSU has been on-going.
- Working groups led by steering committee members met throughout the spring semester to develop imperatives to guide OSU to the next level.
- Throughout the summer, the steering committee will review the imperatives and use these to draft a comprehensive strategy.
- A strategy will go before the A&M Board of Regents for approval and launch in September.

Major Takeaways

- There are no tuition and mandatory fee increases for five of the six institutions in the OSU System.
- Enrollments continue to be strong and stable.
- Institutions are planning to deliver merit-based salary programs in FY 2023.
- OSU-OKC is the only institution with HEERF funding budgeted for use in FY 2023. Funds will be used for modification and expansion of entrances and exits as well as other additional spaces needed to promote continued social distancing.
- As the new strategy for OSU is finalized, funding will be identified and purposefully re-directed to ensure success.
